On a wet and chilly afternoon, Dave & Betty (dressed in all their finery) made their way to Buckingham Palace to attend one of the King's summer garden parties.

The process started in late 2023, when "secret squirrels" made enquiries about the nomination process. Dave had no idea that people had been working behind the scenes trying to find a way to recognise his and Betty's services to the community.

In February 2024, Dave and Betty received a letter from the Lord-Lieutenant of Kent, Lady Colgrain, informing them that they had been put forward as deserving of an invitation to attend The King's Garden Party.

The acceptance form was completed and they received a formal invitation from the Lord Chamberlain. At this stage, Dave discovered who had put his name forward and he thanked them for nominating him and Betty.

The weather was not kind on the day, with torrential downpours forecast and the forecast was not wrong!

The Garden party was hosted by the Prince of Wales, representing his

father, King Charles. Other members of the Royal Family also attended.

Dave drove to Green Park adjacent to Buckingham Palace to the allocated parking area. After security checks Dave & Betty entered the Buckingham Palace gardens to be met by Royal Household staff who directed them to a designated area for meeting

members of the Royal Family. Here they had great pleasure in speaking to other guests representing communities, charities, the armed services and the NHS.

At 3.40pm the Yeoman of the Guard came out from the Palace doors and walked to the gardens followed at 4pm by Prince William and other members of the Royal Family. The guest greeted them with an array of umbrellas!!

Whilst Prince William joined guests from charities, Princess Eugenie and Princess Beatrice came over to Dave & Betty's group of guests and spoke to them. They were then all invited to the marquee for refreshments.

After a pleasant hour of chatting to fellow guests over refreshments they left the Palace Gardens and went back to the car to drive home. Their only disappointment was not meeting the King and Queen, who did not attend because of the rain.

Burham School - A Brief History



In 1858 the curate Rev. William A. Keith saw the need for education in Burham and suggested a church schoolroom for about 80 children as needed. The Earl of Aylesford granted land and most of the building funds were raised locally. Instruction cost 2d per week per child, with a reduction for a 3rd and 4th child from the same family.

The building was to become Burham Church of England Primary School and stood in Rochester Road (opposite the war memorial). In 1867 the accommodation was increased by an additional classroom. A teacher's residence was also provided. By 1870 the recorded attendance had increased to 136 pupils, and to meet the requirements of the Education Department further enlargements were necessary. By March 1872 a further classroom was added. The Education Department and the Diocesan Office contributed to the cost, the remaining funds being raised locally

The principal ratepayers, who owned the local cement works, took no interest in the school, which had been built to educate their employees' children. The school was transferred to the care of the Education Board on a 21 year lease. Seemingly the building was further enlarged during 1878 to accommodate 400 boys and girls.

During 1890 the Board built a new boys' school, for 150 pupils, on the corner of Bell Lane. Girls and infants of both sexes continued to occupy the older Burham Church of England Primary School, until the lease expired in 1896.

At this time, the vicar Rev. A. E Bourne, proposed to take back the older building and re-open it as a church school. The Board reluctantly agreed, being unwilling to burden the ratepayers with the expense of providing new premises for the girls and infants. However the Education Department agreed to continue its annual grant and the church school reopened on 14th December 1896. Various repairs to the building were carried out and an additional cloakroom and main drainage were added.

All was to change in 1958, when older boys rejoined the girls at the Church School and the infants moved to the Board School. This arrangement continued until a new school was built in Bell Lane and opened during 1985. The old Church School was demolished and houses now occupy the site. The board school is now the Phoenix Community Centre.

Ken Jones - popular teacher & Head at Burham School

Ken Jones was a popular teacher at our village school for thirty-eight years with his final seven as head teacher.

Many of you will have been taught by him or had children taught by him and will recall that 'Mr Jones' - as many still call him - was a force to be reckoned with both in and out of the classroom. He has many fond memories of the school and village.

He arrived as a naive 22-year old fresh out of teaching college from a small Welsh village. Ken's passion was drama but he was unable to pursue this at university because he got a place at teaching college and his academic grades slipped, a salutary lesson that great things can come for second options and drama's loss was Burham's gain! Ken joined the school as part of a team and quickly learnt the importance of teamwork and established an ethos where all contributions were valued from cleaner to kitchen staff and teachers. He understood that learning was not al-

ways about academic results and introduced an Art Week, a gardening club and many sports activities achieving great success. His drama found an outlet when he started a School Panto, with a teacher cast which developed into a children's event engaging all abilities. One of his greatest moments was creating School Council which resulted in a visit to 10 Downing Street arranged by the local MP at the time.

Ken Jones was all about the children; he fought hard and tirelessly to ensure every child had a positive learning experience be it academic or in life skills; he armed all that came in contact with him with a strong sense of community that is the very heart of our village life. I wonder if he knows the difference he has made and somehow continues to make daily.

Phoenix Medical Practice

New Surgery at Peters Village

We have encountered issues with the land owners Trenport regarding this and these were highlighted by a local councillor last year in the following article - Council leader accuses Trenport of 'holding community to ransom' over Peters Village Medical Centre (kentonline.co.uk) Since then, the Bushy Wood development has been given the green light yet we are still no further forward. We will continue to try to work with Trenport to progress this development and to get our very much needed larger premises.

Patient Participation Group (PPG) I have tried on a few occasions to find someone that would be prepared to take over as the patient lead for the PPG and act as the direct conduit between our patients and me at the Practice without success. If anyone feels that they can dedicate the time in helping mould

the workings of the Practice, I would

be pleased to hear from you. Did Not Attend appointments

You may be aware that: the demand for appointments at the Practice far outweighs the number available. To make this more frustrating for both patients and the surgery is when patients fail to turn up for booked appointments. Over the last 3 months, the average number of DNA's per month were 86 which equates to over 14hrs of lost appointments or nearly 2 days a month. Each DNA costs the NHS £120!

Respect and Politeness

Our receptionists continue to get abuse on the phone through to abusive and intimidating behaviour to our GP's not only on the phone but also face to face. As a polite request, please treat our staff with the respect they deserve.

Uncollected Prescriptions

Another issue that is causing valuable dispensing time to be wasted is where patients fail to collect the medication that they will have requested. On average, the total time taken to deal with this is 10hrs every 6 weeks and as mentioned takes away valuable time from our dispensing team who are already under pressure to continue to keep to our 4 working day turnaround.

Other Clinical Staff

Many patients will be aware of the two additional clinicians we have to support, Dr Thom and Dr Beerstecher. Oksana Gonchar is our trainee Advanced Nurse Practitioner and Pallavi Pai our Prescribing Paramedic Practitioner. Both Oksana & Pallavi have extended skills/qualifications and are able to triage, diagnose, treat, prescribe and refer and see patients like the GPs. Both will have a GP to liaise with to ensure the most appropriate care/treatment plan is agreed with the patient so if you get an appointment with either, please bear in mind they can cover the same things as either of the GPs here.

Chair & Vice Chair

Cllr David Young was elected and accepted the post of Chair with Cllr Bill Stead as Vice Chair in May.

Land at Eccles

Road changes: Whilst there is no firm time frame regarding implementing highway changes it is likely to be 12 months "before spades were in the ground".

Work to the War Memorial cross A start date is awaited from the contractor likely to be early August. A free-standing wall for the names of the 24 "Lost Men" not included on the war memorial is in the pipe-line. A new union flag was purchased and installed at the war memorial.

Community Litter Pick

This took place 18 May with 5 residents attending (including 2 councillors and an employee). 5 bags of rubbish were collected. Our thanks to residents Jas Bradley, Julie Hogbin & Paul Croucher who attended.

Scarborough Terrace speeding

May Update: KCC have agreed to fund a gateway scheme of new signage and road markings. The Parish Council have confirmed the proposals and an installation date from KCC Highways is awaited.

Church Street: KCC Highways are not proposing to make Church Street one way as the ditches still allow vehicles to

pass but will continue to monitor the situation. New signs were installed during May.

Burham Car Parks

The re-lining of the three car parks (Village Hall, Bell Lane & Church Street) has been booked for 5 August when car parks are less busy. All vehicles will have to be removed during the duration of the work. The Village Hall overflow car park will remain open. Notices will be placed on vehicles and around car parks prior to the works commencing.

Burham Recyling

TMBC have removed all the recycling banks from recycling site. Note: The cardboard and the clothing bank are remaining as they are not under the remit of TMBC. They generate revenue for the village so please use them when possible.

Borough Councillor's Report

TMBC's Annual Council met on 14 May and elected Cllr Steve Hammond as Mayor of TMBC for the next 12 months. Chairing meetings with a finely balanced council will be a challenge but his past experience at RBLI should hold him in good stead with his varied civic duties. We wish him all the best.

Car Parks: TMBC is a top performing council when managing its finances and although it goes unnoticed by most residents, it is a massive advantage to them in low TMBC Council Tax and high-

grade services. However, for about 2 years, TMBC has seen a gap developing in the TMBC revenue budget with central government grants being reduced and our Council Tax capped at 3% when average annual inflation has being more than 10%. Sadly, the only viable solution, apart from cutting already stretched services, means we have had to start charging for the use of TMBC car parks. Parking charges are tightly controlled by law and can only be spent on items laid down in law. However. there is flexibility to pay for many of the revenue items to plug the impending gap. This revenue shortfall had led to a review of car park charges across the Borough. Generally, each car park had a unique set of issues such as legal covenants, supermarket partners or a preponderance of user types.

Two local TMBC car parks used by our residents affected are:

Aylesford Bridge Car Parks: This policy badly affects our residents especially those in Aylesford, where TMBC will be charging for the two Bailey Bridge Car Parks.

We were able to get a reduction from an initial proposal of £290 to £120 for an annual season ticket for a specific car.

There will be exclusive use of some parking spaces for season ticket holding residents. There will be an hour's free parking to allow for school drop off. Charges will not be implemented until the car park is extended. The latter concession means there will probably be no charges for about a year. Cllr R Dalton did not support these charges from the outset. He was one of the 5 Borough councillors that called the Cabinet decision into OS committee.

Martins Square Larkfield: This car park is also used by Burham residents.

The principal concern was passing trade using the shops and shop staff parking. The decision was that car parking charges will be introduced but with one hour's free parking and season tickets available at £120 per annum for shop staff

AGILE: There has been no change since our previous reports.

KCC Report by Cllr Andrew Kennedy

Almost 20 years of restricted government funding, along with inflation linked increases in council tax, against a backdrop of increasing demand for services, has left much of local government in a perilous financial position.

Over 100 local councils, districts, counties and powerful unitary councils such as Birmingham and Croydon, have technically gone bankrupt or issued warning notification that they are about to do so.

Kent County Council is not in that position, but I would be lying to say that things are not very tough.

Tens of millions of savings required to produce a legally balanced budget over the coming years will leave KCC with but no option to look at some core services. The alternative to this is a Section 114 notice, which will result in government commissioners moving in and imposing a 10% increase in council tax while stopping all discretionary spending. It is ironic that a badly managed council which goes bankrupt is then allowed to increase council tax and will receive additional government emergency funding, but a well-managed council (like Kent), trying its best to balance its books, is starved of resources and forced to make cuts. We appear as a country to reward failure while punishing success.

The biggest issue KCC faces is the cost of Adult Social Care. As the Deputy Cabinet Member for Adult Social Care and Public Health (and

Kent's Mental Health Champion) I see at first-hand how difficult this is. The Adult Social Care budget is £600 million a year – almost half of the entire KCC budget, but the money is spent on just 2% of Kent's population. This is 10x the money spent on Highway repairs and potholes. No wonder so few people understand where the money goes.

However, we are dealing with some of the most vulnerable people in society, whose very life depends on the care we provide. These range from people with severe disabilities who cannot be looked after at home, to residents with dementia and older people who fall ill and whose families cannot (or will not) look after them. There are people in Kent who are so limited in what they can do that they require 24-hour care from more than one carer – at a cost of over £100,000 each.

The other issue are people being discharged early by the NHS to release bed capacity. These vulnerable people will almost always need to go into a nursing or acute care home, and once they do the cost of their care transfers from the NHS to KCC.

I will give you one example of the challenge we face. Last year demand for adult social care increased by 10%. This equated to an additional £60 million of statutory spending. The 4.99% increase in Council Tax brought in an additional £47 million. Therefore, the maximum allowed increase in council tax did

not even cover the increased cost of social care – let alone cover any increases in highways, potholes, schools, country parks, HWRCs or anything else provided by KCC.

Locally I continue to do my best for the community. I continue to push for speed restrictions on New Court Road and on Rochester Road at Scarborough Terrace. Regrettably, the speed monitoring undertaken does not meet the threshold required to trigger calming, but I will continue to push for this.

I continue to support local community groups and charities via my KCC Members' Grant and my privately managed Community Pot. The Community Pot is a sum of money arising from me not accepting a pay increase and paying this money into a fund which I use to top-up the KCC Grant.

Since my election I have allocated funding to Burham as follows:

£150 for Remembrance lampposts poppies

£1,000 to renovate the War Memoria and to engrave additional names

£700 for litter picking supplies for Burham and surrounding villages £300 for educational toys for Burham Pre School

£300 towards a new Community Defibrillator at Frosts Garage

£500 to Burham-based Animals Lost and Found in Kent

£500 for Burham Village Jubilee Celebrations

£55,000 grant for the new Community Minibus shared between Burham and Wouldham

And, of course, all our local primary school children received sunflower seeds to grow over summer, and in December 2023 over 150 veterans and community heroes (25 from Burham) attended my annual carol concert and buffet support at the Capel Morris Centre in Aylesford. Both of these events were financed by me from personal donations or money I raised in sponsorship from local businesses and friends.

Finally, I have been told (verbally, not yet in writing) that my bid for £3,000 of community cohesion funding from TMBC has been successful. and I can now push ahead with my Community Bridge website, listing all community and voluntary groups (over 200 of them) which operate in our local area. This is a trailblazing scheme (the first of its kind in the UK) which I believe will benefit residents, social prescribers, GPs, parish councils and all those involved in community activities locally. It will provide a simple to use point of reference for local groups to advertise what they offer, and for local people to make contact and find out more free of charge for both groups and users. I am hugely grateful to Cllr Des Keers for informing me of this funding and for his support in the application process.
